

Dr Mary-Rose Puttick is a Research Fellow for the Institute for Community Research and Development at the University of Wolverhampton working on interdisciplinary projects and leading the migration and mobilities research strand. Mary-Rose has worked with families from refugee and newly arrived backgrounds for the past twenty years in teaching, research, and advocacy roles across the adult education, schools, and third sectors. Mary-Rose's doctoral research, completed in 2021 at Birmingham City University, used a cocreative ethnographic approach to explore the family language and literacy practices of newly arrived women in the refugee third sector. Mary-Rose has recently completed a British Council-funded 'Waiting

for School' project where she explored formal and informal forms of literacies for young people who are living in temporary accommodation in the UK and waiting for a school place or are newly arrived to school. Mary-Rose has also worked closely with the City of Sanctuary charity for several years and is currently working on a national evaluation of their Schools of Sanctuary strand, including practices of literacies across schools and the wider community that are underpinned by a culture of welcome. Mary-Rose has a particular interest in spatial literacies and learning from Indigenous literacies.
